On Thursday, March 5, the Porcupines matched up against the Fairview Warriors for their first game of the tournament. The score was close through the entire game. Fairview held the lead at the end of the 1st, but Nashua came back at the half leading 35-27. The Porcupines kept the lead through the 3rd but only by a mere 4 points.

The score was tied at 69 in the fourth, but Nashua got possession with just seconds left. Willy Lauckner got the ball and put up a buzzer beater that went in and gave the Porcupines the victory, 71-69. Brandon Hansard was the high scorer with 20 points followed by Lauckner with 12.

Once again in a semi-final game, the Porcupines faced the Scobey Spartans on Friday night.
