The Porcupine boys' basketball season came to a close at the Divisional Tournament in Sidney.

The Porcupines first match up was against the Culbertson Cowboys. Nashua won the game, 66-58. Leading scorers for the Porcupines were Brandon Hansard with 25, Willy Lauckner with 20, Anthony Bengochea with eight, Jordan Sibley with seven, and Sean Bengochea with six.

The Porcupines were then defeated by the Fairview Warriors in the semifinals, 48-56. Sean Bengochea lead the team with 14 points, and Anthony Bengochea had 12.

The Porcupines then played the Lustre Lions in a loser-out game, defeating them, 57-45. Leading scorers for the Porcupines were Hansard with 22, Lauckner with 13, Jordan Sibley with nine, and Sean Bengochea with seven.

Nashua's final game of the season resulted in a loss to the Froid/Medicine Lake Redhawks, 47-59, in the consolation game. Hansard raked in 14 points, Sean Bengochea netted 13, and Anthony Bengochea made nine.
